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Unraveling Piracy: Enforcement of Film Copyright in Indonesia's Digital Era

The findings provide strategic recommendations to strengthen copyright protection in Indonesia in the face of digital era challenges.

These policies provide legal certainty and protection for film industry players in Indonesia.

Furthermore, Indonesia's cultural diversity is a rich source of stories and inspiration for Indonesian cinema. The country also boasts many young, creative, and talented film professionals. This potential offers significant opportunities for the Indonesian film industry to continue evolving and become one of the leading film industries in the world.

In recent years, the Indonesian film industry has shown rapid development. Film piracy causes significant financial losses for film producers. With easily accessible and inexpensive pirated films, people are likelier to choose to watch films illegally rather than go to the cinema. The decrease in theater attendance directly affects the revenue received by cinemas, distributors, and film producers.

Film piracy can stifle creativity and innovation in the film industry. Film producers hesitate to invest in new projects if their films can be easily pirated and published illegally. The uncertainty surrounding the return on investment makes producers more cautious and less willing to take risks on innovative projects.

The decline in cinema attendance can result in fewer films being produced and fewer job opportunities in the film sector. Consequently, many workers in the film industry may lose their livelihoods. Stricter law enforcement against film pirates is essential. Increasing patrols and raids against the sale of pirated films and imposing severe penalties for violators can be practical steps to reduce film piracy. For instance, in 2021, a man in Jakarta was sentenced to two years for being found guilty of pirating and selling films online.

Indonesia has the Copyright Law (Law No. 28 of 2014), which regulates copyright protection, including film works. This law provides a legal framework to protect copyright and impose penalties for violators. Institutions such as the Directorate General of Intellectual Property (DGIP) and the Creative Economy Agency (Bekraf) enforce copyright. In Indonesia, film piracy is generally carried out by recording films currently showing in cinemas using electronic devices. These recordings are then uploaded to illegal websites and distributed online. Ironically, some illegal websites even provide high-quality pirated films, attracting many visitors to watch them for free. This demonstrates how sophisticated pirates' methods are in exploiting legal and technological loopholes for personal gain.

The impact of film piracy is significantly detrimental, especially for Visinema Pictures. They suffer substantial material losses due to a decrease in the number of viewers in cinemas, which should be their primary source of income. Moreover, filmmakers and actors feel disappointed because their hard work is not adequately appreciated. The Indonesian film industry is also harmed, as piracy can hinder the growth and development of an industry striving to rise and compete internationally.

Visinema Pictures has not remained passive in facing this piracy issue. They have reported piracy cases to the authorities, as with the seven illegal websites. Additionally, they have collaborated with social media platforms to remove pirated content and urged the public to watch films legally in cinemas. This step shows that strict law enforcement and collaboration with various parties are vital in combating piracy.

The case of "Mencuri Raden Saleh" teaches several important lessons:

- 1. The importance of strict law enforcement against film piracy. The law must be enforced impartially to deter offenders.
- 2. Public education is needed about the dangers and negative impacts of film piracy. The public needs to be made aware that watching pirated films harms filmmakers and damages the industry as a whole.

3. The film industry must enhance its efforts to protect copyrights, including using more advanced technologies to prevent illegal cinema recordings.

Partnerships with the film industry, government, and civil society organizations can further strengthen education and socialization efforts.
